Nossal High School and Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne are the top performing NAPLAN schools in Melbourne's southern suburbs.

An independent analysis of newly released 2022 NAPLAN results has revealed the schools which performed the best in the Year 5 and Year 9 tests.

Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne, in Cranbourne, had better primary results than any other school in Southern Melbourne, scoring an average of 576.6 across the five test subjects.

Toorak College in Mount Eliza was the second best for the region with an average score of 573.6, while Shelford Girls' Grammar in Caulfield was the third best with an average score of 569.8.

The top performing secondary school was Nossal High School, in Berwick, with the average result was 676.8.

Haileybury College in Keysborough was the second best for the region with an average score of 649.0, while Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne in Cranbourne was the third best with an average score of 642.2.

To determine how each school performed in 2022, the scores for all five test subjects for the student cohort (Yr 5 or Yr 9) were combined and the average found. Special schools, schools with fewer than 20 students enrolled, and schools that did not report any results for NAPLAN subjects were excluded from the analysis.

The figures were independently compiled from the Federal Government's MySchool website.

Lighthouse Christian College in Cranbourne is the best-value top-performing school in Victoria, soaring past many high-fee schools in academic results.

Despite 93 per cent of its student body coming from non-English speaking backgrounds, the school is ranked 12th in the state based on year 9 average NAPLAN scores.

This is despite the fact that it charges average fees of just \$2173 a year.

This puts them well ahead of many other schools costing more than \$35,000 in year 12 such as Mentone Grammar, ranked 220, Xavier College, ranked 234 and St Michael's Grammar, ranked 292.

Other superstar low-cost schools with top results include Sirius College which is ranked 115th in the state with an average fee of \$3226 per year and Red Rock Christian College which is ranked 55 with average fees of \$3788.

In this next article they have reported our fees as \$6291 – more than three times our actual fees!

The private primary schools worth paying for

Some Victorian schools charge \$30,000 for year 5, but is it a wise investment? These are the primary schools where splurging on your child's education will pay off.

There are select private schools across Victoria where splashing your cash on primary school fees is worth it.

The Herald Sun has compiled a list of the 20 top-performing private primary schools in Victoria, using average year 5 NAPLAN scores from last year.

Students are marked in key learning areas: reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy.

Presbyterian Ladies' College topped the list with a median score of 598.4. The prestigious school charges more than \$28,000 in fees for a year 5 student.

Harkaway Hills College came in second with 592.4, charging a more modest \$9239 in tuition.

In the state's east elite independent schools Fintona, Camberwell Grammar and Camberwell Girls Grammar ranked closely behind, scoring 587.8, 587.4 and 581.4 respectively.

Fintona and Camberwell Girls' charge around \$25,000 in fees, whereas Camberwell Grammar charges more than \$30,000.

Lighthouse Christian College in Cranbourne and St Andrews Christian College in Wantirna South were other lower paying schools that ranked in the top 20 with scores 576.6 and 575.4.

The best primary schools in Victoria have been named, with more than <u>20 government schools topping the list.</u>

The Better Education analysis of <u>2022 academic outcomes</u> shows private primary schools including Camberwell Grammar School, Presbyterian Ladies' College and Camberwell Girls Grammar School took the top three spots, with each receiving a perfect score of 100. But three state schools including Serpell Primary School in Templestowe, Beverley Hills Primary School in Doncaster East and Oakleigh South Primary School were also in the top 10 and scored 100.

The website is run independently and describes its aim as providing "informative and comparative school results, including school rankings or ratings and lists of best performing schools, to parents wanting to make choices about schooling for their children".

On and on goes the different reports in various articles of educational news each reporting with its own bias and errors. Suffice to say that we have received unsolicited publicity from the media because it cannot be denied that LCCC has

indeed performed very well in the 2021 and 2022 NAPLAN both at primary and secondary levels. Below are some facts about our school.

School Overview

Having registered as an independent school in January 2008, Lighthouse Christian College Cranbourne (LCCC) completed its 15th year of existence at the end of 2022. LCCC is dedicated to helping Christian families (especially of Pentecostal persuasion) by providing affordable and good quality Christian education for their children. As an independent school, we are committed to providing the choice that many Christian families are looking for in terms of the type of education for their children. In 2008 LCCC only received registration for classes from Prep to Year 8. We received approval to go up to Year 10 as of 2011 and approval for Year 11 and Year 12 as of 2012 and 2013 respectively. In 2022, we had our tenth cohort of Year 12 students graduate from our school. There were 42 Year 12 students in 2022. In terms of VCE subjects, we continue to offer 13 subjects and a few more by Distance Education (Virtual School Victoria) and VSL. Over the years, God has helped us hold on to the heavenly vision and the school has continued to experience strong enrolment growth, increased staff numbers, many new facilities etc. Our students continue to perform exceptionally well in the NAPLAN tests, showing that the school-home partnership is continuing to bear fruit. All our VCE students obtained a VCE certificate. We did not have any indigenous students at our school in 2021. Our vision to serve the indigenous community is still strong and only God can enable us to help them. The growth of our school population is being restricted by VicRoads condition requiring a traffic signaled intersection for LCCC before any growth beyond 1000 students. We were given a permit to have up to 1000 students on condition that we construct a traffic light intersection for entry and exit. This could cost LCCC in excess of \$3 million for a project that is for the benefit of all travelers on South Gippsland Highway, Devon Road users and for those using our school. The increased traffic on the Highway is not mainly due to LCCC's growth instead it is mainly due to the accelerated growth of our Casey community. We have requested financial help from the state government in this matter but we are yet to hear conclusively of the amount they are willing to commit to this project.

We give thanks to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has helped us thus far and to the school community that has stood by the vision of the school.

Vision

To build a unique school that will equip a Godly and skilled generation to reach their God-given destiny and transform their community.

Enrolment

At census 2022, the enrolment at LCCC was 1025 students. Of these 537 were male and 488 female students. We did not have any indigenous students. We have many children who are on waiting list for a place at LCCC but cannot come in because of Department of Transport restrictions. What began in the words of many as a bubble, continues to be consistent growth instigated and sustained by God. Our growth to date over the last 13 years is tabulated below.

In 2022 all year levels were double streamed and there had to be a third class of Grade 4 and Year 7 students to cope with the larger number of Grade 4 and Year 7 students. We had up to two teachers and three teacher's aides to help in the large classes. Almost all our permanent teacher's aides are tertiary graduates (Bachelor and higher). When there are enough classrooms all the Primary classes will be triple streamed.

'Word of mouth' continues to be our only form of advertisement and the stable enrolment is God's favour and partly a reflection of parent satisfaction with the school's vision.

Student Attendance

Average **student attendance** during the Student Attendance Data Collection period was 88%. 51% of our students attended 90% or more of the days. Preps and VCE student attendance were not included in the data. The attendance of students had dropped due to sickness and students travelling overseas to catch up with family members whom they had not seem for a long time due to Covid restrictions. Generally, students were away only due to illness except in some cases where they had to visit families overseas as many of our students have grandparents overseas and were restricted to visit them over the Covid lockdowns. Student non-attendance is carefully monitored by the marking of attendance twice a day (at 9.00am and at 2.00pm). If no phone call is received by 9.30am on the day of absence, the office staff will contact the parents to determine reason for absence. In addition, a note for absence must be written in the student's diary by the parent, to be presented to the class teacher. Whole school absences are recorded daily in a diary at the front desk. Late arrivals and early dismissals are also recorded in separate folders at the main office. Attendance is also maintained in electronic form for the purpose of reporting to the government.

There were no indigenous staff employed at the school in 2022.

We had about 40 casual staff on top of the 117 staff who were permanent during the year so the administration had to keep track of over 160 staff.

Staff signed in daily to show attendance and any absence required the completion of a leave form. The introduction of electronic sign in and sign out has been well received by all staff at LCCC.

Staff attendance in 2022 was outstanding. The dedication of LCCC staff was exceptional.

Once again, no external casual relief teachers were employed as all absences were replaced internally. This was a financial saving to the school and also provided better continuity of study for our students. Average full-time teacher attendance rate for 2022 was 95.7% (not taking into consideration leave taken without pay). Average attendance rate for full time teacher aides was 94.9%. We lost 11 staff members over the 2022 year. Two were full time teachers, one part-time teacher, four teacher's aides (3 full timers and one part-time), 1 administrative staff, 1 cleaning staff and 2 bus driver.

As many as 40 of our ex-students, most of whom were attending tertiary studies did casual part time work at the school.

Teacher Qualifications


All LCCC teachers are registered with the Victorian Institute of Teaching and hence hold suitable qualifications to teach in Victoria. Teachers hold degrees ranging from Bachelors to PhD in their areas of speciality. Almost all our teacher's aides hold at least a Bachelors degree. Our team of teachers, with considerable years of teaching experience, are dedicated to making sure that students succeed academically. All Literacy and Numeracy from Prep to Year 12 are taught by specialist staff (that is, they have majored in the area). Some staff continued to offer after school classes to help students disadvantaged by the COVID lockdown. Ever since classes resumed at the school site we were able to use the state government Tutor Program financial grant to help students who had fallen behind due to working from home. VCE teachers held after school and holiday classes to help our students succeed and the school is grateful for their dedication. Our teachers are also capable of caring for the whole person because of their spiritual commitment. They attended weekly staff meetings, various staff (professional development) inservices and external professional development meetings to improve their ability to serve the students.


Student Progress & Achievements Student Learning

Our students continued to maintain excellent academic progress due to the combined efforts of teachers and parents. Students had a good attitude to study and were committed to doing homework.

NAPLAN RESULT

Data included in this section were obtained from the 'My School' website. Due to COVID-19 lockdown we did not have NAPLAN tests in 2020. For 2022, the socio-economic standard of our families was 1087 up again from 1074 in 2021, which is slightly above average. LCCC still caters for many needy families. For the vast majority of families, English is not their first language. In reality, 93% of our families are from language background other than English and more than 85% of our students will not use English except at school. This is one of the reasons why we continue to offer free English tuition after school. We also have allocated more lessons for teaching the English Language.





Despite the disadvantage of being from non-English speaking background, our students performed very well right across the board. We continue to work hard to help our students succeed. Doing such noble deed as helping our students succeed does not bring any financial benefit to the school. In Australia the converse is true. Schools with weaker performance are considered as needing more funding. Our major incentive is to fulfil the heavenly vision.

As most of you are aware, we started Bible comprehension on a daily basis (as homework) 5 years ago. This was a God inspired initiative that continues to bear fruit. Our students are getting more familiar with what the Bible says while they make progress in their Reading Comprehension. This is also drawing some families together to do their devotion around the Bible passages being read. We have continued the intensive reading classes for younger students who are not making sufficient progress in reading.



LCCC average is in large bold and our range below it. SIM stands for similar schools and ALL stands for the average of all schools. The green shading makes it obvious that the average performance of our students is well above that of similar schools and the state in all areas of assessment. LCCC students have continued to make great progress in reading over the last 3 years. We give glory to God for such exceptionally good results. Special thanks to our teachers and parents.

Students sit for NAPLAN in Grade 3, Grade 5, Year 7 and Year 9. To be able to judge the progress made by students in 2022, we need to compare their performance in 2020 (does not exist due to Covid lockdown), 2018 and 2016. Students in Grade 3 in 2016 would have sat for Grade 5 in 2018, Year 7 in 2020 (did not happen) and Year 9 Naplan in 2022. LCCC students have maintained their progress over the years due to the consistency of education at school and follow up at home. This progress is an outstanding achievement for a school like ours where the majority only speak English as a second language. May I acknowledge the extra effort put in by our English teachers Mrs Simon, Mrs Johnson, Mrs. Wesley, Mrs Burratto, Mrs Alex, Mrs Reny,Mrs Verghese, Mrs Graceline, Mrs Wankadia, Mr. Choi and Mrs Choi, etc. to achieve this progress.

Our students have also performed exceptionally well in Numeracy at all levels and Mrs Yong, Mrs Glory, Mrs Jacob, Mrs. Fang, Miss Reena, Mrs Madavan, Mrs. Joseph, Mr George and Mrs. Padmaja are to be congratulated for their input in achieving this success. As can be observed from the tabulated figures given, we had outstanding performances in Literacy and Numeracy. In most areas the lowest figure in the range given to our results is above the average figure given to similar schools. For instance, in 2022 results by looking at the range for Grade 3 numeracy LCCC's low is 464 while the figure given as average for similar schools is 423, In Grade 5 numeracy, from looking at the range our low is 547 and similar schools' average is 509. We can observe the same pattern in all the results. LCCC's lower result is much higher than the average of similar schools and the state average. Only in reading do we compare with the rest of the schools as being closer to their result. Let us continue to work at our Reading comprehension while we maintain the rest and see our children perform better. All these good results could not have been possible if our Prep, Grade 1 and Grade 2 teachers had not laid such a good foundation in literacy and numeracy. By Grade 3 LCCC students have already caught up with advantaged students in the state and are well ahead of the state average. Our no nonsense Prep to Grade 2 teaching is focused on developing Literacy and Numeracy skills. With disciplined classrooms without noise and distractions students can get on with their learning and teachers with their teaching.

Students get up to 9 hours per week for Literacy and 9 hours for numeracy which allows us to lay a good foundation. This result is a product of the combined efforts of teachers from Prep to Grade 3. We want to also acknowledge the efforts of parents in helping children with their reading and spelling. Thanks for following up on their homework. The partnership is certainly working. LCCC students are at least 50 points ahead of the state in their mean score. We see an extreme difference in Spelling of 85 points difference and in Grammar 71 points difference.

It is very important that students begin their early years of study at LCCC as it becomes more difficult for them to catch up in later years. Students also progress rapidly in character development and spiritual maturity in those early years.

Parents were asked 52 questions. Majority (more than 95%) of our families were able to participate in it. In the second column are the questions that were asked. The third column gives the number of families that responded to the question. In question 1 parents were asked to rank the school on a scale from 1 to 10 as to if the school treats students from different backgrounds equally. The higher the ranking the more the respondent agreed with the statement. 68% rated the school at 10 meaning that 68% of the families agreed that there was equal treatment for

students from different backgrounds. The last column shows the percentage of families that rated LCCC between 8 and 10 which in the case of the first question 91.8% did. Clearly the vast majority of our parents are very satisfied with the school and partner diligently with LCCC to help their children excel in their education.

VCE and Post-School Destinations 2022/23

We give all glory to the almighty God for the good results that have been achieved this year. In 2022, we had our 10th cohort of students which consisted of 42 students. After two years of interrupted learning, our students were able to complete this whole year in class with face to face teaching. Despite the disruptions to their learning over the past few years, our students persevered, worked hard and performed well.

Australian Tertiary Admission Rank

This year we recorded 8 students achieving an ATAR score over 90, this means that those students were ranked in the top 10% of the state in terms of their aggregate study scores. Our highest ATAR score was 97.3, which was achieved by Joanna Premaka who was one of the recipients of the Principal's award. Our median ATAR was 74.6. Additionally, 88% of our students achieved an ATAR over 50 which is our highest percentage of over 50 results. This is even more impressive given only one of our students elected to complete their VCE without a score this year. In past years, we have had between 3 and 5 students complete their VCE without a score.

Study Scores

In 2022, there were 20 study scores over 40, which is one of our best results. A score over 40 places our students in the top 9% of the state and is a testament to their hard work and determination in their study. This year over 8% of all our study scores were over 40, this is one of our best results. The highest individual study score was achieved by Joanna Premaka who received a study score of 46 in English, which was equaled by Nadun Dissanayake in Further Maths. The scores over 40 in Legal studies were the most that have ever been achieved in the subject. This year we have achieved a median study score of 30, although this is a slight decrease on last year's result, our consistent median study score of over 30 is an indicator of a strong VCE program. In each of the past four years we have been able to achieve a median study score of over 30.

Value added

Activities were almost back to normal in 2022. Most activities and events went on as usual. The school camps had to be held in-house due to lingering uncertainty about Covid resurgence. Students received free after school tuition which were funded partially by the Tutor Program funding by the government. We received about \$142,600 (including GST) as part of the Tutor Program which was fully expended on helping students who had fallen behind academically due to Covid lockdowns. The Concert Night along with the Presentation Nights were well attended and they were major get together functions. The many excursions, Athletics Carnival, Fun Fair, Spelling Bee, Bible Challenge, Public Speaking etc. were added joyful experiences for the students and staff. We thank God for His help and acknowledge the many hours of added work by committed staff and volunteers. The school looks exceptionally clean and the gardens well kept by our Maintenance staff and Cleaning team. Thanks to the Bus Drivers who provide door to door service for almost half the students at the school. The school provides this service at a discounted rate for the benefit of families who have work commitments.

Leadership and financial state of the school

I have been blessed to be the Principal of this school over all these years of growth. The excellent organisation and smooth running of the school can be attributed to the dedicated and responsible staff of the school. Mr Cicchiello (Deputy Principal), Mrs Simon (In charge of development from Prep to Year 8) and Mr Niles (who has been responsible for the VCE years Year 9 to Year 12) has provided stable and strong leadership.

Mrs Mathews, who is the Business Manager has continued to help families plan their finances, and manage LCCC finances in such a way that we were able to give bonuses to all our staff and still have a positive balance. Once again we did not have any bad debts in 2022!

Our financial performance for 2022 is as reported on the next page. As you will notice our major contributor of funds is the Commonwealth Government, without which a school like ours would not be able to help families who are disadvantaged financially. The State Government was the next biggest contributor to our income. As a community, we only contributed a small portion to our school's income. We thank the Governments for their support in our efforts to make Australia a better nation and assure them that this school continues to be one of their best investments. As expected, our major expenditure was salaries.

Miss Zoe who is our Administration Manager continues to streamline the school office and its procedures. She also makes all our events extra special and memorable. She is also the first point of contact for parents seeking admission for their children. Being a good communicator she has helped communicate the vision of the school to both parents and students I would like to acknowledge the valuable IT support that the school receives from Mr Jinil. NAPLAN is now on line and so is most of our administrative processes like attendance, parent teacher interview bookings etc.

Our College Council members are actively working behind the scenes to steer the college in the way God wants it to. They are a steadfast and dedicated team who are unwavering in making sure that we keep our God given course. We can thank them for their prayerful and wise decisions as well as their unity. The College Council is made up of Ps Phil Cayzer, Mr Jacob Mathews, Mr Michael Goode, Mr Darren Evans, Mr Gregory Ohlson, Ps I. B.
